



Coffee with Lindiwe

We caught up with Lindiwe Miyambu, AfroCentric's Chief People and Marketing Officer, to discuss authentic leadership and building meaningful connections with employees across the organisation.

Lindiwe grew up in a family and community culture of service to others and carries this philosophy into every decision she makes. For her, HR is not just about management or policy; it is about shaping an environment where people, culture and brand are intentionally and powerfully aligned. Lindiwe's attentiveness to people and her ability to engage meaningfully at C-suite level were not forged through effortless wins. With a deep connection to her global family, Lindiwe lives a life as layered as the people she leads.



Q: Tell us about your career background and what you've learned from that.

My time in the public sector proved to be a demanding but invaluable training ground – one that strengthened what I call my “quieter muscles”, namely diplomacy and negotiation. The public sector requires a very particular kind of resilience – one that tests patience, adaptability and emotional intelligence.

Q: What are you most excited about at AfroCentric/your role?

I was drawn to the AfroCentric Group by the opportunity to meaningfully contribute to the growth and strengthening of the healthcare industry – an industry that touches every life so deeply.

The impact of COVID-19 on our country and the world was a powerful reminder of how vital a resilient healthcare system truly is. Being involved in shaping and driving this agenda helps create a better society, promotes the gradual levelling of access to healthcare, ensures better care and value for every rand spent, and perhaps most importantly for me, supports what I call “humanising the world again”.

Q: Who inspires you?

I draw my greatest inspiration from the strong women in my family – my grandmother and my aunt. Their resilience, wisdom and unwavering strength have shaped the way I see the world and the values I carry into my work and life. They embody perseverance and compassion, and their example continues to motivate me to lead with integrity and uplift others.

I visit Kramerville, which continues to grow my passion for interior design.

Q: What are you reading or watching right now?

I am drawn to legal documentaries and TV shows — I enjoy the way they unpack complex issues and bring real-world cases to life.
